THE ACCOUNT OF THE LORD'S ENTRANCE

All four gospels tell of Jesus' entry into Jerusalem before his arrest. In Luke there is an emphasis on Jesus as the one who brings peace and has a deep compassion for the people.

The Lord be with you.

And also with you.

A reading from the Holy Gospel according to Luke.

Glory to you, Lord Jesus Christ.

Jesus went on ahead, going up to Jerusalem. When he had come near Bethphage and Bethany, at the place called the Mount of Olives, he sent two of the disciples, saying, 'Go into the village ahead of you, and as you enter it you will find tied there a colt that has never been ridden. Untie it and bring it here.

If anyone asks you, "Why are you untying it?" just say this: "The Lord needs it." 'So those who were sent departed and found it as he had told them. As they were untying the colt, its owners asked them, 'Why are you untying the colt?' They said, 'The Lord needs it.' Then they brought it to Jesus; and after throwing their cloaks on the colt, they set Jesus on it. As he rode along, people kept spreading their cloaks on the road. As he was now approaching the path down from the Mount of Olives, the whole multitude of the disciples began to praise God joyfully with a loud voice for all the deeds of power that they had seen, saying, 'Blessed is the king who comes in the name of the Lord! Peace in heaven, and glory in the highest heaven!' Some of the Pharisees in the crowd said to him, 'Teacher, order your disciples to stop.' He answered, 'I tell you, if these were silent, the stones would shout out.'





And when he entered Jerusalem, the whole city was in turmoil. 'Who is this?' people asked, and the crowds answered 'This is the prophet Jesus from Nazareth in Galilee.' Jesus then went into the Temple.





Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.


It is right to give our thanks and praise.

Therefore with angels and archangels, and with all the company of heaven, we proclaim your great and glorious name, for ever praising you and singing:




After supper, he took the cup, and again giving you thanks he gave it to his disciples, saying, 'Drink from this, all of you.

As our Saviour Christ has taught us, we are confident to pray,


Our Father in heaven, hallowed be your name, your kingdom come, your will be done, on earth as in heaven. Give us today our daily bread.



HOTHAM MISSION AT WORK: VOLUNTEERS NEEDED

Volunteers are essential for the on-going work of Hotham Mission.

Currently there are only five paid staff, and they are all part time. When you add their time fractions together it amounts to an Effective Fulltime workforce of 1.75. They are Neysa (Homework Club), Kymberlee (WomEmpower), Danielle (Food for Thought and Homework Club), Alex (Mount Alexander College Cooking Class), and Joey (Food for Thought and Coordinator of all programs).

Each member of staff is putting in a lot of effort and all programs are going well.

But the staff need help!

Already they are supported by several enthusiastic volunteers, but more are needed. The Mission would like to establish a pool of volunteers from which people can be called upon to help where help is needed most.
