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INTRODUCTION

Peter has often been called the "Prince of the Apostles" because of the words of Jesus re-naming him from Simon to Cephas. This was the Aramaic form of the Greek word Peter, which means "rock". Jesus said that on this rock he would build his Church. But both Peter and Paul came to be seen as having different roles to play within the leadership of the Church: Peter in witnessing to the lordship of Christ and Paul in developing an understanding of its meaning for Christ's followers. Peter and Paul have been remembered jointly on this day since the very early days of the Church, it being regarded as the anniversary of their martyrdom in Rome in about the year 64.

LENGTH OF DAYS

At the end of last Sunday's 10 am Eucharist, celebrated on a particularly cold Melbourne morning, I expressed gratitude for to everyone present for their attendance despite the briskness of the day.

There is a constant flux and flow of life but for the Christian it is always undertaken in the light of Christ's guiding and ever sure presence no matter the challenges life presents to us. In six months' time it will be summer, and we will have just celebrated Christmas! I am not trying to wish time away but merely to emphasise the forward movement of life.

I am grateful for coming to the parish at this time of the year because it affords us time to get to know each other a bit and to live in this lovely but brisk wintertime knowing that the springtime is ahead of us which we will share and shape together.

WHAT OF OUR SHAPE?

Last Sunday, Geoff Jenkins shared a response to my homily about living a eucharistic life. He mentioned that some footy commentators speak of a team losing their shape when they don't play well. It is a rather captivating image, isn't it? When the team is in shape it works well together and accomplishes many good things.

One way to look at this more broadly is that there is a constancy about the shape – the team or group or community – which is its 'whole' if you like. It is never the same and always changing and dynamic. People come and go and yet the shape is there. It adapts and changes.

I guess a new priest and their community are a shape in this community of North Melbourne – we are always in flux and change. But there is a distinctiveness and character – which is after the life and pattern of the Lord Jesus Christ. It is nourished and enlivened by him, the Spirit and centred and grounded in God. We never shape shift – after the model in some popular television shows and stories – but we are always being moulded by the Lord. The image of the potter comes to mind and the guiding hand of the Lord.

May the Lord shape us gently and enliven us in our life together.

Next Sunday, 6 July, marks the beginning of NAIDOC Week. It also falls just after the beautiful Feast of the Coming of the Light. This feast is celebrated by the peoples of the Torres Strait Island on 1 July every year and it marks the coming of Christianity to the islands in 1871. It is a joyous feast and many of the people of the Torres Strait are the most devout Christians I have known.




A reading from the Acts of the Apostles:

About that time King Herod laid violent hands upon some who belonged to the church. He had James, the brother of John, killed with the sword. After he saw that it pleased the Jews, he proceeded to arrest Peter also. (This was during the Festival of Unleavened Bread.) When he had seized him, he put him in prison and handed him over to four squads of soldiers to guard him, intending to bring him out to the people after the Passover. While Peter was kept in prison, the church prayed fervently to God for him. The very night before Herod was going to bring him out, Peter, bound with two chains, was sleeping between two soldiers, while guards in front of the door were keeping watch over the prison. Suddenly an angel of the Lord appeared, and a light shone in the cell. He tapped Peter on the side and woke him, saying, "Get up quickly." And the chains fell off his wrists. The angel said to him, "Fasten your belt and put on your sandals." He did so. Then he said to him, "Wrap your cloak around you and follow me." Peter went out and followed him; he did not realize that what was happening with the angel's help was real; he thought he was seeing a vision. After they had passed the first and the second guard, they came before the iron gate leading into the city. It opened for them of its own accord, and they went outside and walked along a lane, when suddenly the angel left him. Then Peter came to himself and said, "Now I am sure that the Lord has sent his angel and rescued me from the hands of Herod and from all that the Jewish people were expecting." (Acts 12.1-11)

As for me, I am already being poured out as a libation, and the time of my departure has come. I have fought the good fight; I have finished the race; I have kept the faith. From now on there is reserved for me the crown of righteousness, which the Lord, the righteous judge, will give me on that day, and not only to me but also to all who have longed for his appearing. But the Lord stood by me and gave me strength, so that through me the message might be fully proclaimed and all the gentiles might hear it. So I was rescued from the lion's mouth. The Lord will rescue me from every evil attack and save me for his heavenly kingdom. To him be the glory forever and ever. Amen. "Lord, who is it that is going to betray you?" When Peter saw him, he said to Jesus, "Lord, what about him?" Jesus said to him, "If it is my will that he remain until I come, what is that to you? Follow me!" (John 21.15-22)
